Annual Message from the Chairman

Stratton's Annual Report from Robert Jandy

In many ways this has been a busy and

momentous year for Stratton St Margaret. We have many things to celebrate, we have kept our precept to a 0% increase for the 3rd year in a row, which me and my fellow Councillors believe is a massive achievement, also more "boring" things such as having pieced together a Corporate and Strategic Plan for the first time, giving the Council priorities and goals moving forward and planning future finances to provide the very best services to the community.

We are currently implementing a Youth Provision within the Parish for the first time and we are heading towards having the Local Government Award Scheme Quality Award. We have also completed and implemented the Neighbourhood Plan after many years of finalising the details.

We now work firmly in partnership with Stratton Junior Football Club with the lease agreement for the pitches at Merton and Jutland Avenue and we value this connection and what this organisation brings to the parish. We have invested into our Meadowcroft Play Park and upgraded this with new equipment, which saw a grand opening last year.

In February this year we planted a tree and commemorative plaque in the green area between Weedon Road and Gayton Way (Coleview) to celebrate the local hero John White and his efforts in the community over the years in football training

for the younger generations.

Another big announcement is that we have reinvented and redistributed the Parish Council Newsletter after a period of 4 years!

The Council has supported local organisations over the past year to the sum of £15,300 through the Grand Aid process.

We are currently undertaking a lengthy study and consultation with regards to the Library facilities and enhancing the Community Hub in Beechcroft Road and also to build a Skate Park within the Parish!

None of the above can happen without the hard work and dedication of all the Stratton St Margaret Parish employees and Councillors. From the Clerk, the Open Spaces Team, Finance Team, Admin Team, Library Team and the Democratic Team, we offer our thanks for your continuing efforts. Plans are also underway to extend and develop the play park to provide more for the older age groups, including a bouldering wall (see pictured).






Green Road Chapel

Once all of the renovations have been completed, we are hoping to hire out the chapel to local groups to be able to display and sell their art work in the chapel.



FINANCE

Councillors understand the difficulties we have all faced in the past two years and the cost of living squeeze we will face this year. As a consequence, we were determined not to ask for any additional money from hard pressed parishioners. SSMPC is pleased to report that the committee recommended that the budgeted precept for 2022/2023 remain frozen at 1,369,964 pounds, the same level it has been for the past three years.

This chart shows a general overview of where the precept is spent.

The council's finance team have been working very hard throughout the year to improve and develop the councils systems and controls. They ensure our day to day relationships with banks, suppliers, internal budget holders, contractors, and partners are conducted in a proper and prudent way.

Thanks to our teams dedication & hard work in June 2022 we passed our internal audit!

PLANNING & HIGHWAYS

Committee

Although not a decision-making body, this committee meets regularly, once a month, to look at planning applications within Stratton Parish and comment on developments in our neighbouring parishes.

Parishioners are always welcome to attend and air their views and to observe our workings. The committee can 'call-in' to the Borough Council those plans it believes to be contentious. Committee members are kept informed concerning road works as it affects, or might affect, our local roads.

In 2019 the planning committee introduced a neighbourhood plan

under the Localism Act 2011.

The aim of this plan is to give communities the right to shape and develop their areas. The Stratton St Margaret neighbourhood plan has been prepared by residents and led by Stratton St Margaret Parish Council and shaped by various surveys and public consultations to accurately reflect the needs and wants of the community.



OPEN SPACES



Our Open Spaces Management team have been doing what they do for decades and we think their experience shows. It might surprise you how busy and complicated public land management can be, so please read on to get a taste of it.

- We have 10 people in our department and an arsenal of equipment to aid us in our work which includes 1 large & 1 small tractor, 4 ride on mowers and a mini digger.
- We have around 160 acres of land to manage, split into over 100 land parcels, ranging from large to small.
- We mow all of our grass every 3 weeks from end of March to end of October. Some priority areas are done fortnightly.
- We have around 2 miles of hedges that are trimmed 1-3 times a year depending on priority.
- We spend around £15,000 annually maintaining trees.
- We spend around £75,000 a year clearing rubbish and emptying our 137 bins.
- We have 2 active cemeteries and we provide a burial service every 4.8 days on average.
- We have 2 allotment sites and 151 registered tenants.
- We have 10 children's play areas and 4 basketball/mini football courts. We spend around 1,100 hours each year managing and maintaining them at an annual cost of around £17,000. This excludes any improvement projects.
- We have created and now actively manage around 5 acres of wild flower meadows.
- We usually plant around 500 trees every year.
- We provide flowers in many flower beds and planters around the parish.
- We help residents with their wide ranging land management queries and often have to take action to encourage private land owners to improve the maintenance of their own land.
- We always investigate every single enquiry we receive and will always reply to residents. We welcome your feedback. Oliver Saunders, our Open Spaces Officer, will happily speak with you.

Summer Gardening Top Tips!

In summer you will probably see a lot of beneficial wildlife activity in your garden and hopefully lots of flowers.

A great way to help bees and butterflies is to grow plants in your garden that provide lots of nectar for them to feed on. Some good examples include Buddleia, Lavender, Hebe, Ivy, Foxglove, Honeysuckle, Oregano, Caryopteris and Jasmin. Nearly all plants that are highly beneficial to pollinators require a lot of sunshine, so make sure you plant them in the sunniest parts of your garden.





It's a great idea to provide a bird bath and keep it topped up with water. Why not create a cool, damp spot for amphibians by making a log pile in a shady corner? For best results semi-cover the log pile in soil to insulate it from extreme temperatures and line it with moss. If you are really adventurous, why not create a pond? The internet is full of advice on how to build one.

Water management is very important. It is a good idea to use rain water in your garden rather than tap water, as it has more beneficial qualities within it for plants and is more sustainable.

We have around 5 acres of wild flowers throughout our parish, split into 3 larger areas and around a dozen smaller ones. We are always looking for new areas where we can attempt this but WE DO understand that residents want and need short grass in most areas in order to be able to use it. Lists of wild flower species that we have growing can be obtained from the office but here are a few pictures, all taken on our land, to show you a few of them.

We know foxes are intelligent, wild creatures with strong survival instincts and there are many living in Stratton. Foxes are beautiful creatures that are there is much to admire about them.

They do not need our help though. **PLEASE DO NOT FEED THEM**. They are capable of feeding themselves. We are receiving a greater number of complaints from residents, about the numbers of foxes living in peoples gardens. They can be very disruptive for people and we do not want to encourage their numbers to grow.

Their diet is wide-ranging and includes invertebrates, birds, mammals, carrion and fruit. Because a fox can take poultry, lambs, gamebirds and other wildlife including species of conservation concern, it is one of the main subjects of predator control (Reynolds & Tapper 1996).

Fox populations have grown rapidly in the last 25 years due to excessive amounts of food being availabale for them generally. In 1995, their population numbered around 240,000 in the UK. By 2018, this number had reached 357,000 (Natural England, Mathews et al 2018). Latest numbers are unknown.

We have heard of people leaving out food regularly for them. This also encourages rats. We have even received reports of residents throwing food over the fence into our allotment site at St Philips road, to feed the foxes that live there. Please do not feed them.

Please let these animals fend for themselves without encouraging them.

Multiple plots have become vacant this season at St Philips and our Allotment Administrator is working hard to get these cultivated and ready to be rented out.

We recently installed new water troughs at St Philips which will help us to be more economical with our water consumption and makes it more convenient for the plot holders.

At our White Hart site we are currently in the process of creating 14 brand new plots which will be ready by October 2022 to rent out to those next on our waiting list.




Meet our Youth Development Worker,


Ash Die-Back

Disease or Hymenoscyphus fraxineus is a serious problem to our native Ash trees. It arrived in the UK in 2012, and will kill around 80% of Ash trees across the UK. At a cost of billions, the effects will be staggering. It will change the landscape forever and threaten many other species.

It's a fungal infection that is carried by wind infecting new trees. Infected spores can carry for miles in the wind, so it spreads incredibly fast.

At Stratton Parish Council we are aware that these trees pose a health and safety threat which is why we are commissioning a special survey this summer to check their health. Any dangerous trees, particularly Ash, will be reduced or removed immediately. We usually spend around $\mathfrak{L}15,000$ a year managing our trees and we are budgeting more and more annually to ensure they are safe.

It is important that we all plant a tree in our garden if we have space and can manage it. A greater variety of tree species in the landscape is a good way to avoid mass extinctions caused by diseases such as Ash Die back Disease.





Meadowcroft Park to Receive Huge Investment in 2022 and 2023

At a meeting on Wednesday 29th June, the Parish Council agreed to the following new projects all of which will be paid for using grant funding and s106 funding. S106 money comes from housing developers who have built houses within the parish. Total spend will be around £300,000.



Extend the car park to create an extra 30 minimum spaces to cope with the increasing usage. Football and other events occuring on the weekends create a lot of extra traffic at Meadowcroft. Parking is a real problem and we have received many complaints about the way the local roads and pavements are used especially when the football pitches are busy.

To resurface and widen the 340-metre-long footpath that crosses the rear of the park from Farrfield to Dockle Way. We have received several complaints in recent years including notification of people actually falling over on the surface. It would also benefit from being wider so that people walking or on bikes or scooters can pass each other more easily.





To improve the play area at Meadowcroft. This area has a large catchment and is very popular. There is obvious demand to provide more equipment for the age category 12-18 (juniors). The proposed plans do deliver some more equipment for young children aged under 10 but they focus mainly on equipment for older ones.









To build a brand new skate park for Stratton on Meadowcroft Rec. This will not be delivered until Spring 2023 but this is now agreed and the contractor has been chosen. An enormous amount of planning and public consultation has gone into preparing this project. The proposed plans can be seen below. It's not too late to give your opinion to us on this!



Police update

In 2020 we restructured our Police in order to better focus on the Communities we serve, this has enabled us to have small groups of dedicated officers given a responsibility for a geographical area. Our team's work closely with local authorities, charity organisations and residents to help decide policing priorities which helps us find long term solutions.



The community is at the heart of everything we do, the information that the community provide us with, helps us shape our response to issues that directly affect you. Since the end of the pandemic reports of crime have started to go back to the levels we saw pre-pandemic but under this new model we are able to look at sustainable long term solutions and preventative measures to help reduce this demand, more importantly to make the community in which we are based a safer place to be.

The pond at Church Park, near St Margaret's Church, which dries out each summer is home to a thriving population of the very rare Great Crested Newt. We manage the pond accordingly to protect this species. Contrary to popular belief they actually spend the majority of their

lives out of the water.

Ermin Street in Stratton is part of an old Roman Road known as the Ermin Way. It was one of the oldest Roman Roads in Britain. Running from Glevum (Gloucester) via Corinium (Cirencester) to Durocornovium (Wanborough) where there was a large Roman settlement.

The Parish Council has been accredited with the Quality Award through the Local Council Award Scheme. Quality councils go above and beyond their legal obligations, leading their communities and continuously seeking opportunities to improve and develop even further.


